

WINNIPEG OMNIBUS: APRIL 2011

STUDY ON CHANGES TO THE CURRENT GARBAGE AND RECYCLING PROGRAM

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1.0 How this research was conducted

The Omnibus survey was conducted in April 2011. In Winnipeg, 467 residents, 18 years of age and over, were interviewed by telephone on a range of issues.

Respondents were selected by random digit dialling, which allows us to include those with unlisted or new numbers. This technique produces a random sample that includes the highest possible percentage of eligible respondents.

1.1 Weighting

The data presented in this report were weighted to correct for differences between the demographics of the sample and the Winnipeg population. Tables presented are weighted unless otherwise stated

In some cases, when the random sample produces a divergence from Canadian census data, we correct for slight discrepancies in gender, age, and income. For example, since men tend to refuse to participate more often than do women, and since younger Winnipeggers are often more difficult to find at home, we re-weight the data to conform more closely to Statistics Canada information.

Since this technique assigns a percentage "weight" to a respondent, the number of weighted respondents may be slightly different from the total number interviewed.

1.2 Caution

This document represents a summary of the results and is not intended to be an exhaustive examination of the findings.



2.0 Findings

2.1 Changing the garbage and recycling collection schedule

We explained the following to Winnipeg residents:

The City currently collects garbage and recycling on a rotating collection schedule. Instead of having your garbage and recycling collection day change each time there is a stat holiday, the City is considering collecting by a fixed day of the week. This change would mean that your garbage and recycling would be collected on the given day, even if your day was a holiday.

We then asked respondents if they would prefer to keep the current rotating collection schedule or change to a collection day of the week. Winnipeg residents tended to be split in their opinion with:

- ► More than 4 in 10 (46%) saying they would prefer to keep the current rotating collection schedule.
- ► More than 4 in 10 (45%) saying they would prefer to change the schedule to have a collection day of the week.

About 1 in 10 did not like either option (4%) or did not provide a response to the question (6%). See Table 2.

Table 3 presents the profile of respondents by the schedule option that they prefer. While there are no statistically significant differences among the demographic subgroups, it appears that Winnipeg residents who are 18 to 24 are more likely to prefer changing to a collection day of the week and those 65 years or older are more likely to prefer keeping the current rotating collection schedule.

2.2 Changing the Blue Box recycling program

We explained the following to Winnipeg residents:

Winnipeg currently has a "Blue Box" recycling program, which allows residents to put out their recyclables for pickup every week. Because more residents are putting out multiple Blue Boxes each week, the City of Winnipeg is considering replacing this Blue Box system with larger blue automated recycling carts. Switching to this system would be more efficient than collecting them by hand, and would result in fewer litter problems.

We then asked respondents whether—if the cost of recycling cart collection was the same as the current Blue Box collection—they would prefer to keep the current Blue Box and the once-a-week pickup schedule, replace the Blue Boxes with larger recycling carts but continue with the once-a-week pickup schedule, or replace the Blue Box with larger recycling carts but change the pickup schedule to once every two weeks. Winnipeg residents tended to be mixed in their opinion, with most preferring to replace the Blue Boxes with larger recycling carts but continue with the once-a-week pickup schedule. More specifically:

- ▶ About 1 in 3 (32%) prefers to keep the current Blue Box program and the once-a-week pickup schedule.
- ▶ About 6 in 10 (63%) prefer to replace the Blue Boxes with larger recycling carts:
 - More than 4 in 10 (42%) prefer that the City continue with the once-a-week pickup schedule.
 - About 1 in 5 (21%) choose to change the pickup schedule to once every two weeks.

Less than 1 in 10 did not have a garbage and recycling day (3%) or did not provide a response to the question (6%). See Table 4.

Table 5 presents the profile of respondents by the schedule option that they prefer. Among respondents:

- ▶ Winnipeg residents who are 18 to 24 are the least likely to prefer to keep the current Blue Box and the once-a-week pickup schedule and those 65 years or older are the least likely to prefer to replace the Blue Boxes with larger recycling carts but continue with the once-a-week pickup schedule compared to the other age cohorts.
- ▶ There are no other statistically significant differences among the demographic subgroups.
